What you may not realise is that the transcription of all births, marriages and death records is a nationwide project, being carried out by dedicated volunteers some of whom are members of our society. So far the St Helens group of transcribers, have completed transcription of some 380,000 birth records since October2006 covering 1837 to 1964

#### Farnworth Church

20 members of our society attended our outside visit to Farnworth. We were escorted round the church and it's surroundings by church members Barry Horabin and Alan Locke. We were all fascinated by the history of this church founded about 1180. What gem it is, in the midst of industrial Widnes. It houses many interesting architectural features showing the various stages of development over the centuries. There are a number of funeral "hatchments" ( colourful crests of local families ) also on display is crest of King Charles 11 placed in the church in 1661, it remains as colour-



ful today as the day it was painted. A chapel within the church is dedicated to the locally well known Bold family. There is too much history to take in at one session so your editor for one, will make a return visit.

be helpful. In 1837 registration of all Births, Marriages and Deaths became compulsory in England and Wales. The primary records and indexes are held in the local Register Offices. It is these indexes which are being transcribed, with the assistance of local history societies. A secondary index is held by the General Register Office. As each section is completed, it is scrutinised for errors and omissions. When complete, it is submitted to the local co-ordinator for publication on the internet, Eventually all records will be available on the web.
