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

So on to 2011, our first event on 27th January consisted of an invitation by the Mayor of St Helens Mr Neil Taylor to visit the Mayor's Parlour and to tour the Town Hall. Our members are pictured being entertained to tea and biscuits by the Mayor.



We were then escorted by the very knowledgeable Mr Jim Taylor through the magnificent and largely original rooms of the town hall, rarely visited by members of the public

The Retirement of Thomas Alfred Turton, 1st September 1939

I felt so very lucky to join the Family History Society's tour of St Helens Town Hall at the end of January, as among my family heirlooms is a photograph of my grandfather's retirement presentation, conducted in the Town Hall in 1939, where he worked as a magistrates clerk. I was keen to find the room where it took place and if possible take a photograph. When I showed my photograph to our guide Mr Jim Taylor, he immediately knew the location—The Member's Room.

After refreshments in the Mayors Parlour we moved on accompanied by the Mayor Mr Neil Taylor, to the Member's Room. The far corner was easily recognisable as the setting in the photograph. The Mayor very kindly suggested that I be photographed shaking his hand,



standing in the same spot as Grandad had 71 years ago. What a special moment. The Mayor was wearing the same chain of office as the Mayor in my grandfather's day. It is over one hundred and thirty years old, The Mayor told me that retirement presentations still take place in the Member's Room today.

Displayed in the corridor leading to the Mayors Parlour are photographs of the Mayors of St Helens. The mayor in my photograph is easily recognisable as Nathaniel Birch, in office from 1938—1940. The man with the glasses between him and Grandad looks very like Edward Burrows, Mayor in 1937. On the back of my photograph, a family member has noted that among the ladies standing are Miss Edith and Miss Evelyn Pilkington. The seated lady is Mrs Dodd JP, who lived near Grandad in Windle Street.

On the table is his gift of a pair of binoculars in a monogrammed leather case which I still have. Unfortunately his right arm obscures his

retirement clock. The clock is in an oblong art deco style wooden surround, with barometer, hygrometer and thermometer. A small metal plaque is inscribed as follows

Presented to T A Turton by his friends the Magistrates of St Helens on his retirement as Justices Clerk September 1st 1939

The clock hangs in my brother's hallway and still works well with a new battery mechanism

Grandad was born Thomas Alfred Turton at St Ann's Stores, Eccleston, on April 9th 1878, He was the sixth of eight children born to John Turton a Bookkeeper, and Catherine formerly Lockhart. Grandad died aged 88 having outlived all his siblings and is buried in Hard Lane Cemetery

Like most children growing up in the 1950's with few toys. I had a box of bits and pieces picked up or given to me by various relatives to play with. One such item is a swimming medal that belonged to my Great Uncle Thomas Hughes Spencer. I think it must have been given to me after Thomas died, somehow I have managed to hang on to it for over 50 years.

Thomas was awarded the medal for winning the Maiden Handicap at the Swimming G ala of 1890. I thought it would be interesting to see if I could find anything out about the medal so I contacted St Helens Swimming C lub.



Ian Turner the secretary of swimming club came back to me with some back ground information about the swimming club which I have reproduced below.

"The earliest record that we have for an individual event is the 'Challenge Cup Handicap' winner in 1894 although the club was formed in 1885. The club was very successful in the early days when clubs competed in both water polo and individual/team races. We have no records of the numbers involved at that time however it can be assumed that the numbers were large as the club competed across the country with various teams. Your great uncle's medal



of 1890 is now the earliest known record to date for St Helens Swimming Club".

From what I can remember Thomas had the medal attached to his pocket watch chain which probably accounts for the amount of wear on the front. The watch was given to me when I was 21, I have no idea what happened to the chain.

So not only is this an interesting family heirloom it's also a piece of our towns heritage
